A Year at a Glance

Since the return of meeting in person at monthly meetings after the pandemic, we have seen, heard and accomplished much over the past 16 months. We have had many guest speakers, including Father Jim Mockler for the

Diocesan Lenten Retreat in February 2023, Diocesan Archivist Deb Majer with her talk on the history of the CWL in the London diocese in March, Pro-Life dialogue training with Maria McCann in April 2023, the October 2023 self-defence presentation with Tammy Bernardo, and a presentation about the St. Vincent de Paul housing initiative in November.

As well as guest speakers, we have had many functions and events. In March, our council organized and hosted this year's World Day of Prayer Service. We've held our annual Spring Bake and Perennial Plants Sale, raising money for the various charities we support. We've had our Crowning of Mary ceremony led by various women of the CWL and open to the parish. We hosted our second annual Spring Friendship Tea which started last May and is now a regular event, as well as the annual Spring Dinner Dance organized by the CWL and the Knights. And of course, our CWL diocesan convention, held in Sarnia last year and in London this year, is always a great opportunity to catch up with old friends from afar and to meet and make new friends.

Back in the fall, we organized our yearly membership drive on a weekend in late October. Many new members joined and a number of transfer members and returning members attended and renewed their memberships. This was a very successful effort facilitated by Darlene Charette and many members of the council, and we decided to submit our story to the CWL National for inclusion in the Spotlight section of their website. We were selected to be included, and excited that as a result a CWL council in Alberta contacted us for information for their own membership drive.

In November, we had our annual Pie Baking Day and Bake Sale and Craft Sale. Many hands were on

board for these events, as well as for our Saturday morning Christmas Party.

In December we had our council CWL elections, and a new executive was voted in to serve a two-year term from 2024 – 2026. Under the new pillars of Faith, Service and Social Justice, the officers are President, President-Elect (Vice-President), Secretary, and Treasurer, with sub-committees for Membership, Communications and Correspondence. The new theme for the Catholic Women's League is "Here I am Lord, Send me."

A big thank you goes out to our ukulele group the SMUGlees for providing music and entertainment over the past year and more at monthly general meetings, Christmas Socials, the Friendship Tea, the Crowning of Mary ceremony and many other events, including music in the community, such as at long-term care, nursing homes, and the Sisters of Saint Joseph.

Closing out our busy year with our Potluck Dinner and Service Pins celebration, we now look forward to a restful summer until our return in September.

A Summer of Joy: Bringing Joy to Families, Relatives and Friends



We look forward to summer with joy and enthusiasm. Summertime is associated with happiness and relaxation, a break from usual routines and engaging in outdoor activities, like going to parks, beaches, hiking and playing golf. During

summer, we travel, covering distances for vacation to visit families, relatives and friends.

As we countdown to this year's summer, let us remember to be intentional about being joyful and bringing joy to those we meet. It is our calling to be joyful as Christians and to bring joy to others. Peter tells us that we are "a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession..." and we are called to "declare the praises of God who called us out of darkness into His wonderful light" (1 Peter 2:9).

We can draw our inspiration from Mary's visit to Elizabeth in the Gospel of Luke 1:39-45. Her visit brought joy not only to Elizabeth but even to the child in her womb. In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent Angel Gabriel to Mary to announce to her that she would become the mother of His Son. Following the annunciation, Mary set out to visit Elizabeth. Her visit to Elizabeth was a joyful encounter. As soon as the sound of Mary's greeting reached Elizabeth's ears, the baby in her womb 'leaped for joy' (Luke 1:44). Although Mary had more questions than answers concerning her pregnancy, although she did not understand fully well what it meant 'to be conceived of the Holy Spirit', although she was surrounded by many imperfections, she trusted God and walked down the path of joy, recognizing God's presence and actions in her life.

Someone may ask, how can I be joyful and bring joy to others when I am going through difficult times? How can I be joyful when I am grieving the death of a loved one; when my family is going through a crisis; when we are not on talking terms in my family; when I am struggling financially, when nothing seems to be working in my life?

We are joyful not because of the absence of pain and imperfections, but because like Mary, we recognize God's presence and His actions in our lives. Consequently, we are prepared to feel and endure pain in order for us to experience the inevitable joy, even in chaos. This requires the courage to change the things we can change and the courage to accept the things we cannot change. Paul invites us, "to rejoice always, to pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances for this is God's will for you [us] in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18).

As we walk down to parks, as we visit beaches, as we go hiking, as we visit families, relatives and friends, let us be joyful and be channels of joy to people we meet. Like Mary's visit to Elizabeth, let our visit to our families, relatives and friends cause them to 'leap for joy'.

I hope you have a beautiful and joyful summertime!

Issue 21 My Daughter, My Hero



At our May meeting I was fortunate to be able to share my daughter Sherrill's experience living in a women's shelter, starting at age 19 when she was hit broadside by an impaired driver who ran a red light. The air bag imploded but burst and her seatbelt did not catch. Her head went through the windshield

leaving her with permanent brain injury. After this, she met a man named Sam, who offered to let her stay in the basement apartment of his house. Even with Sherrill's love of cooking, it took all her energy to follow a recipe. Gradually she gained more ability to function and perform activities of daily living.

But my monthly visits led me to be concerned because there was a sense that something was not right, she seemed scared. After one visit, she indicated she wanted to come home to London but when we were ready to leave Sam had convinced her to stay. On my way home she phoned and said "Please come back and get me." I went back but there was no answer at the door and her phone was disconnected.

Sherrill had been in the women's shelter four times over the four years I had no contact with her. Then I found a photocopy of her driver's license and went to the London police where I was able to get a new address in Kitchener, and I was able to bring her home. By now she had a one-year-old daughter. The joint custody between Sherrill and Sam only lasted a few months and on his last turn with her daughter they both disappeared, no trace.

Sherrill is my hero. For all she has overcome she still has hope. Despite all she has endured, she is forever so grateful for life. Living in the shelters, she felt guilty that she had failed her daughter; she was dealing with PTSD and deep depression. She was given a care package from donations to the shelter, but she did not feel worthy. Counselling helped her find a glimmer of worthiness, enough to accept a Dove beauty bar, which then became a treasure to hoard, a symbol of her worthiness. "Some woman out there donated this for me, someone cares." Sherrill learned to be courageous and risk living with a purpose. She was determined to find her daughter. While in shelters she remembered only part of the prayer "Hail Mary, full of grace',' that was all she knew. She

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When you donate whatever you are able to, do so with a prayer for the woman who will receive it. That she may find hope, courage, resilience, and support. As a Catholic Women's League member, you're part of a collective voice for her when she cannot speak for herself. Your united voices can lead to change. One thing Sherrill has asked is for me to create awareness about is that the women's shelter on Wellington is in plain sight, with the name on the building right beside the liquor store. She was frightened to leave there and get the bus right out front because she did not know if her abuser was waiting nearby.

Sherrill very much lives in the present moment, not worrying too much about reaching a specific goal at some future deadline. She is more concerned about living each day and loving and accepting those she meets each day. Her daughter is now 19 and Sherrill constantly holds onto hope of having her back in her life.

There are many causes mentioned here – investigation into air bag safety; M.A.D.D.; ANOVA Women's Shelter; Child Find; Brain Injury support, and abuse counseling. Whatever cause you may support, use your voice to be the spokesperson for those who have no voice.

Who took guns away from American sheriffs and confiscated an illegal trunk load of prosthetic legs? Who wrote newsletters for various professional organizations and started our own St. Michael's CWL Newsletter? She may not have a "Double Oh Seven" after her name but we call her... Brown, Gail Brown.

Gail grew up in Windsor attending Our Lady of the Assumption Parish. The eldest of three siblings, Gail attended French First Language elementary school and then went to a girls Catholic high school. After studying Philosophy and Psychology at the University of Windsor, Gail then received a Masters in Library Science from the University of Alberta. She also received her "MRS" when she met her husband, Bruce, at the University of Windsor. They were married and moved out West. Bruce worked as a Crown Attorney in Edmonton, where they had one son. The young family moved back to London where Bruce worked in the Crown's Office and Gail worked in the London Court House Library for 33 years. The Browns had two more sons in Ontario. Gail also has two beautiful grandsons.

Gail reflects that her faith was and is greatly inspired by women. Her grandmother lived with her family; thus, she grew up with traditional Catholic values like saying the Rosary with the family after supper. In her later years Gail has deepened her faith from the

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wisdom of women and especially through their witness of their faith. Gail and her husband Bruce have assisted with RCIA and Marriage Preparation, and Gail was a member and Chair of the St. Michael's Pastoral Council. She was the co-editor of the initial St. Michael's Parish Newsletters.

Gail became a member of the CWL in 1999 after being inspired by a CWL presentation to new RCIA members. She is impressed by women helping women and by the practical things the CWL does such as feeding the homeless by making peanut butter sandwiches, collecting for Anova, and in true librarian style, Gail even collected books for prisoners. As a member of CWL, Gail has had many roles such as Treasurer, Chair of Organization (membership), and Chair of Community Life and Communication. She also started, edits, and publishes our CWL newsletter.

Gail cherishes the connections and friendships she has made with CWL members over the years. It has been important for her to be around like-minded women who inspire her to be a better person. The CWL Zoom meetings helped her to get through the pandemic and she truly enjoys the "off-shoot" activities inspired by the CWL such as SMUGlees and Friday walks with members. When asked what she hopes for the future of the CWL, not surprisingly Gail would like to see a more engaging magazine from the national level of the CWL. At a local parish level Gail hopes we attract new people with new ways of thinking in order to keep revitalizing our council and the parish.

So now you know Gail Brown, and you won't be taken in by her quiet librarian demeanour. She is a strong, educated, kind, generous, faith-filled woman. Remember... besides editing, playing ukulele and baking apple pies...she can take away your gun, speed off on a motorcycle and escape via hot air balloon. She's Brown, Gail Brown.
